DOUBLE HOUSE BURNED.

Richmond Hill has been singularly free from fires for a number of years. Our citizens were startled last Saturday, however, by the ringing of the bell about ten a. m. It was soon learned that the double house on Centre street east, owned by Mr. James Newton and occupied by Mrs. Mapes and Mr. Deadman, was on fire. Mrs. Mapes, who lived in the west end, had made a fire in the back kitchen stove and went to a neighbor's for a pail of water. She had only been out a few minutes when another neighbor discovered the house on fire. It is supposed that a spark blew on some dry wood close by, which ignited, when the fire spread rapidly. The house filled with smoke and scarcely anything of value was saved. The firemen and villagers worked hard, but it was impossible to save the building. The shed at the rear caught fire several times, but the building was saved. Joseph Blanchard's house, directly to the east, was also in danger, but the roof was kept damp, and no damage resulted. Most of the furniture and effects belonging to Mr. Deadman were saved. Mrs. Mapes was most unfortunate. Besides the best of her household effects she lost most of her own as well as her son's wearing apparel and \$74.96 in money. The firemen and others worked well, but the supply of water for the engine was quite limited. The building was ensured, but we believe there was nothing on the contents.
