

The report of Commissioner Starr on the license inquiry in Toronto furnishes interesting reading. It would certainly be a fine thing for the Province if the control of the liquor business could be taken out of politics.

The general opinion seems to be that Hon. G. P. Graham is the right man for the office of Minister of Railways, but a large number of Liberals are not quite sure that it was a wise thing to transfer him from a post where he was doing excellent work as Leader of the Ontario Opposition.

After a struggle that has lasted for years, the bill to legalize marriage with a deceased wife's sister has at length passed both Houses of the British Parliament. For years the British people, through the Commons, have expressed themselves in favor of it; and it was understood that the members of the Royal Family approved it; yet until this session the influence of the Lords spiritual has been so great that the measure has never been able to pass the House of Lords. Now it has passed, but to the very last it was opposed solidly by the Bishops of the Upper House. The bill will undoubtedly become law, and thus the marriage laws in the Old Land will be made to agree with ours in this matter. The Bishop's opposition has rested upon both scriptural and ecclesiastical grounds, but it seems probable that the opposition will now quietly and gradually disappear.

There was an unfortunate occurrence in Vancouver, B. C., during the last hours of Saturday night and the first hours of Sunday morning. An anti-Japanese demonstration was followed by a riot which lasted about five hours, and in which several thousands of hoodlums took part. The Japs retaliated, and the police were helpless. Stones were thrown, knives were used, and after the fray a number of people were removed to the hospital. Much of the property belonging to Japanese citizens was damaged by the mob.

Nearly a dozen arrests have since been made. The Government will doubtless see that the offenders be punished, but in all probability the Japs will demand an apology, and full pay for damage to property. There is a treaty between Canada and Japan by which the subjects of each of the two countries are guaranteed protection for their persons and property, and it is much regretted that the outbreak has taken place.

**GREAT DEMAND FOR HARVEST HELP.**

Western Farmers Want Men for Late Harvest—C. P. R. Will Run Extra Excursion.

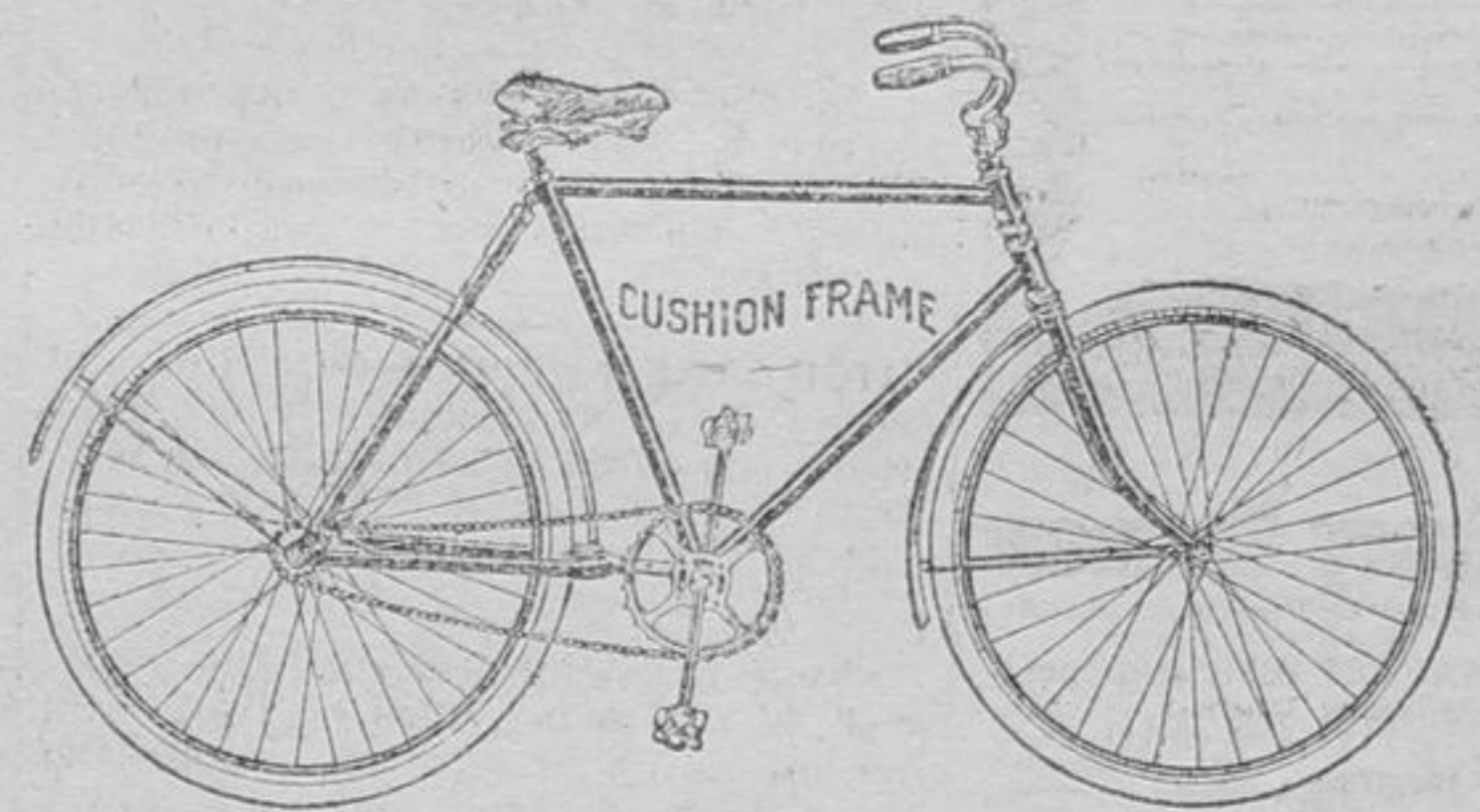
