### ARRESTED IN TORONTO.

William Sidey, late of Bond Lake, for whom the police have been searching for a year, was arrested on Saturday night in a house on York street. The charge against him is that he stole a quantity of copper wire valued at \$200 from the York Radial Company from their store house at Bond Lake. Moses Striesfield of Chestnut Street, who was found with the wire in his possession, was at first arrested and charged with its theft, but he said he had bought it from a man answering to the description of William Sidey, for \$100 and was discharged. The arrest was made by County Constable Tomlinson, assisted by Detectives Tipton and Archibald. Sidey is said to have been working in a northern railway camp for the past year.

### NEWMARKET FAIR.

The Prize Lists which are now being distributed, show an excellent program for the Newmarket Fair to be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the 17th, 18th and 19th of September. On the second day the grounds will be open to visitors at 9 o'clock. At 1.30 p. m. the school children will march to the grounds headed by the Newmarket Military Band. Some of the best athletes in the world will compete, including Tom Longboat, Tom Foley, Tim O'Rourke and others. On the last day speeding contests in the horse ring consisting of Farmers' race, purse \$80; Stallion race, purse \$200; Open race, purse \$200; and a matched race. There will be special attractions in front of the Grand Stand, and concerts in the Town Hall on Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

### A WATER SUPPLY.

A recent number of The Globe states that a syndicate have a plan to supply suburban districts with a water supply. It says:—"Rochester and Toronto capitalists have a plan on foot for supplying all the suburban districts of this city with water. The intention of the promoters is to secure legislation with the consent of all the various municipalities interested, and to construct works on the ridges that lie north of the city. It is said that the offer to the municipalities and districts interested will be of such a nature that it will be a great inducement to

them to support the proposed plan. The places interested are Newmarket, Aurora, Richmond Hill, Thornhill, North Toronto, East Toronto, the Junction, Deer Park, Swansea, Mimico, and smaller places in the vicinity of these more thickly-populated districts. It is said the scheme, if carried out, will entail an expenditure of \$1,500,000.
