News Notes.
The annual report of the C. P. R.
shows gross earnings of \$72,217,000.
Major Frederick Manley, M. A.,
formerly Principal of the Jarvis Street
Collegiate Institute, died on Friday.

It is said the Ontario Government
may establish an institution for the
care of feeble-minded women and
girls.
Addressing the Canadian Club, the
Bishop of London dealt with the se-
crets of a man's influence over his
fellows.

Two pickpockets with long criminal
records, Harry Cox and George Ross,
were heavily sentenced by the Police
Magistrate.
An Orangeville deputation com-
plained to the Attorney-General that
the administration of justice was lax
in Dufferin county.

Mr. Hamar Greenwood, M. P., be-
fore the Empire Club, speaking on the
Japanese trouble, advised Canadians
to rely upon the British Foreign Sec-
retary.
October 7 has been fixed for the bye-
election in Brockville to fill the vacan-
cy in the Legislature caused by the
translation of Hon. G. P. Graham to
the Dominion House.

Bell Telephone officials refused to
discuss the finding of the Telephone
Commission, but Mr. J. W. Curry, K.
C., who acted for the operators, stated
that it was a win for the girls.
That moving certain classes of goods
on Sunday is an act of necessity was
the defence set up by the Grand Trunk
in an action taken against it for al-
leged violation of the Lord's Day Act.

The Bureau of Colonization has sent
to Liverpool for distribution by Pro-
vincial agents there 5,000 copies of Mr.
Edward Harris' pamphlet, "Canada,
the Making of a Nation." There is
also in course of preparation a hand-
book of Ontario, thousands of copies
of which will be sent to Britain for
distribution.

Dr. A. Jobson, Chief Coroner of
the city of Toronto, was in consulta-
tion Monday afternoon with officials
of the Attorney-General's Department
in reference to the evidence in con-
nection with the Caledon wreck in-
quest, which he is conducting.

From eight cents a quart to nine
cents may be the change in the
price of milk in Toronto, on and
after November 1. This is a probable
result of the decision of the producers
to advance the price. A meeting of
the retailers will be held to consider
the situation.

A meeting of the Executive Com-
mittee of the Ontario Association of
Fairs and Exhibitions was held recent-
ly in the office of Mr. J. Lockie Wil-
son, superintendent of Agricultural
Societies, Toronto. The principal
business was the drawing up of a pro-
gramme for the Annual convention to
be held in Toronto on Wednesday
and Thursday, the 19th and 20th of
February.
