HEAVY LOSS BY FIRE.

A destructive fire occurred last Saturday about noon at Newton Brook, when the barn on Mr. Joseph Grainger's farm was burned to the ground, with the season's crop of hay and grain. Mr. Grainger had completed threshing in the forenoon. The fire broke out while they were at dinner. The feed cutting box had been attached to the engine, and it is supposed that the binder twine in the straw twisted around the shafts of the cutting box causing the boxes to heat, and eventually to burst into flame. The loss on the buildings is said to be \$2,000, and on the contents \$6,000. There was a little insurance but the loss will be heavy. Mr. John Wice lost his threshing machine and ensilage cutter in the fire.

A MAN OF THE DAY.

The announcement was made in yesterday's dailies that Mr. N. D. Beck, K. O., of Edmonton, has been made Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Alberta. Mr. Beck is a son-in-law of M. Teffy Esq. Under the above heading to-day's Globe refers to Mr. Beck as follows:—"Mr. Nicholas D. Beck, K. O. of Edmonton, who has just been appointed a puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Alberta, was born at Cobourg and received his earlier education at Peterboro, where his father, Rev. J. W. R. Beck, was for many years Anglican rector.

He was called to the Ontario Bar in 1870 and two years later received the degree L. B. from Toronto University. Mr. Beck practised his profession successively at Peterboro, Winnipeg, Calgary and Edmonton, going to the latter place in 1891 on his appointment as Crown prosecutor for the district. In 1893 he was made a Q. C. by Lord Aberdeen. In Edmonton he took an active part in the town's affairs, acting for several years as town solicitor and as Chairman of the Board of Catholic Separate School Trustees. He has written extensively for the Press, and in the early days of The Northwest Catholic Review was a frequent contributor to its columns. He has taken a stand strongly in favor of free trade, and just as strongly in favor of separate schools in the western Provinces.

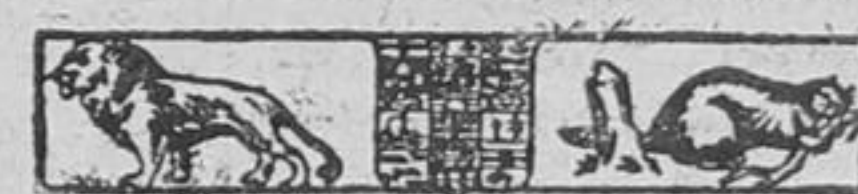
