### DEATH OF WM. NICHOLLS.

William Nicholls, who was well known by the old settlers in this section of the country, died very suddenly at the home of his daughter, Sarah J. George, at Sparks, Nevada, on Tuesday, the 10th of the present month. On the Monday evening before his death he dined with a friend at Reno and on the Tuesday morning of his death rose early and took a walk down town. Upon returning he told his daughter he did not want any breakfast as he was sick and complained of a terrible pain in his chest. She hurried out to prepare him a cup of coffee and a moment later, hearing a noise, rushed back and found her father lying upon the floor dying, and before a doctor arrived had breathed his last. He was buried at Wadsworth beside his wife on the Wednesday following under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias, and his remains were followed to their last resting place by an immense concourse of people. The floral offerings were so many they formed a bank completely covering the grave. The death of a life-long friend—Andy Russell—a few days before caused him to remark "It is hard to tell who will be next." He said it in such a manner that he thought he himself would be, and his words proved only too true. The late William Nicholls was born in Yorkshire, England, seventy-four years ago and when but a small boy came to Canada with his family and settled in Richmond Hill. His boyhood days were spent in this neighborhood, the family working the Bernard farm, and the boys afterwards branching out into the brick-making business. In 1860 he left here and went to San Francisco, and after a time spent in Stockton he went to Nevada and established the noted "Stockton Station." Stockton Station was a stopping place for the famous 18-mule ore teams from the mines. Here they stopped for water paying a bit for a drink and filled barrels to last them till Ragtown was reached. Here he made one of the many fortunes he made and lost during his long life. He was joined by his wife and two small children, who went to Stockton Station by the first train that reached that section. Shortly after this he, with his family, removed to Wadsworth, where he remained until shortly before his death. Of the two children who went from here the younger—Frankie—died, and the elder will be remembered as Mrs. Sarah George, who visited here not very long ago. The Rev. T. M. Bellam, who officiated at the funeral, spoke most beautifully of the life and deeds of the departed man—"a man rare in the quality of his goodness of heart." Mr. Nicholls' wife was Agnes Trench, a sister to the late William Trench, and he himself was an uncle to Councillor Nicholls, the first wife of ex-Reeve Savage, and the wife of William Sheppard. Thus the last of a very old and much respected family has gone to his last long home.
