FINED \$20 AND COSTS.

Early in the month of August search was made at a house near Cosgrove's Hotel, Elgin Mills, and a quantity of intoxicating liquor was seized. The liquor was taken charge of by County Constable Walter Eyer. Charges were laid against the proprietor of the hotel, his son, and the neighbor where the liquor was found, for breach of the local option by-law. The case came up for hearing at the court room here last Friday, before Justices J. Henderson, Toronto, and J. H. Sanderson. Mr. James Haverson, K. C., was present on behalf of the defendants. Mr. Ayerst, Inspector of Local Option districts, was also present. Mr. Haverson admitted the charge on behalf of Mr. Frank Cosgrove. The other charges were then withdrawn against the son and the neighbor. Shipping bills were produced showing that about 60 shipments had been made over the Metropolitan Railway. The magistrates first spoke of a fine of \$40, but after a strong plea by Mr. Haverson the fine was made \$20 and costs, the lowest that can be imposed. The seized liquor was ordered to be returned by Mr. Eyer to the firm in Toronto where it had been purchased.

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
