The recent deliverance of Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, registrar for West Toronto, has created quite a stir in Provincial politics. The speech is looked upon as an attack on the Whitney Government and their power policy. The World of Monday sizes up the situation as follows:

"It is definitely stated, though not officially, that the provincial cabinet will this week deal with the situation arising out of the speech of Dr. Beattie Nesbitt at Gravenhurst, in which the registrar hirted that "John Rockefeller's Boy" was at work within and without the cabinet to prevent the realization of the cheap power policy of the Government. In fact there is to be an investigation which may investigate not only the Gravenhurst incident but go deeply into several matters that have nothing in particular to do with politics, ending with the dismissal of Dr. Nesbitt.'


