## THE GRAND JURY REPORTS.

The Grand Jury Monday afternoon made their presentment before Judge Winchester, in the Court of General Sessions, and were relieved of all further duties, having been in session about seven weeks. The Grand Jury had evidently been alive to their duties, they had visited most of the public institutions in the city and county, and made a number of recommendations. In dismissing the jurymen the Judge said that he concurred in their opinions and hoped that their recommendations would receive due consideration. He referred to their long term, and was pleased to know that they had performed their duties in a creditable manner.

With other important recommendations the Grand Jury made an earnest protest against street parades which interfere with peaceable citizens in the discharge of their everyday duties and often endanger human life.

"We would suggest" continued the jury, "that in order to prevent the disgraceful scenes that occurred on July 12th last, that no street parades or processions be allowed on the public streets unless they are under the absolute control of the police, so as to in future prevent interference with street car or other traffic."

His Honor, Judge Winchester, also promised to look closely into horse stealing cases which have occurred so often recently in the county of York.

The World of Saturday, in reporting the east York Conservative Convention, states that Mr. H. C. Marr of Markham, in seconding Mr. McCowan's nomination, created a sensation by saying that "Mr. W. F. Maclean made much noise, and was wrecking the Conservative party." Many of those present resented the charge, and defended the member for South York.

It is difficult for a body of Conservatives to meet together in convention without a discussion on "the loaves and the fishes" At the East York convention last Friday Dr. Walters, president of the Association, in dealing with the dismissal of civil servants (as reported in The World) said: "With respect to the dismissal of civil servants I advocate either a wholesale adoption of the plan, or the placing of the whole matter outside the realm of politics, and subject to merit." If the present office-holders are to be consulted in the matter we surmise they will select the latter plan.

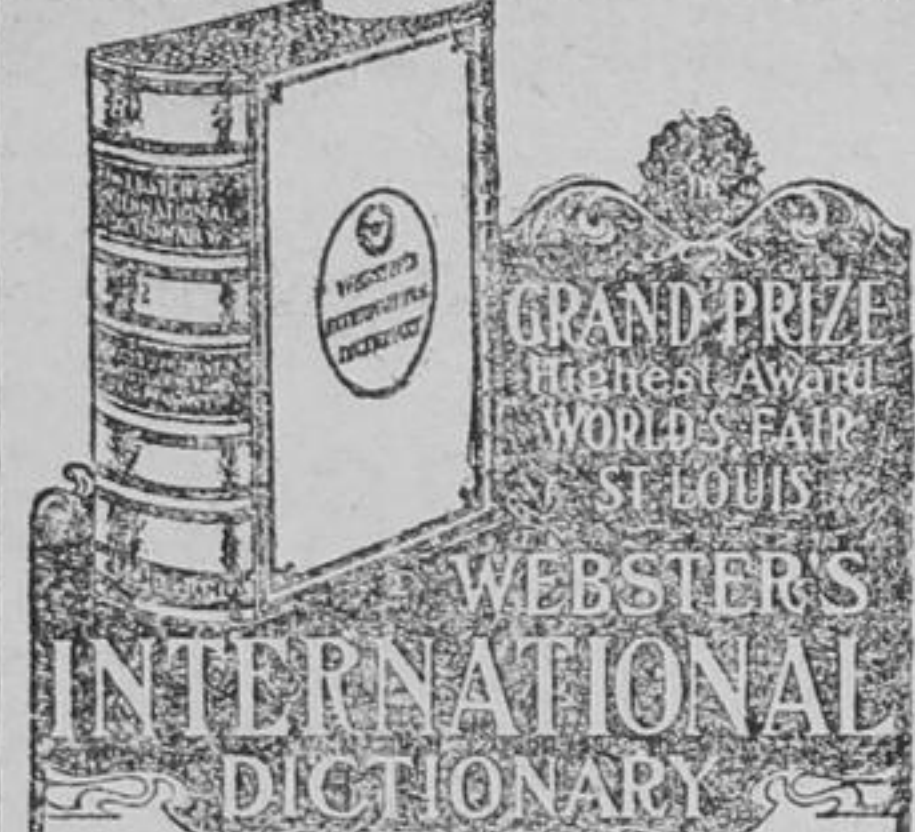
## EAST YORK CONSERVATIVES.
