

I will pay 25c, per bushel for peeling apples, of which I need about 5,000 bushels. Peeling apples may be windfalls, and either sweet or sour apples, but they must be firm and free from rot, and at least about 2 inches in diameter.

I will need about 15,000 bushels of cider apples for which I will also pay an advance over former years. I will pay from 20c. to 25c. per bag according to quality. If you have any apples that will not sell in the City bring them along and tell your friends and neighbors.

The factory will be open every day for the purpose of buying apples up to Nov. 28, but will do custom work only as advertised.
