RESOLUTION PASSED.

At a recent meeting of the Toronto Conference Temperance Committee it was "Resolved that this Temperance committee of the Methodist Church desires to express its gratification of the deep interest taken in the movement for the suppression of the bar-room, as manifested in the many Local Option contests that are under way, and also its gratification at the efforts of the Government to secure a thorough enforcement of the liquor laws generally, and further resolved that it is earnestly hoped that the Government and Legislature will, at the next session, repeal the three-fifths requirement which now interferes with the adoption of Local Option By-Laws in many localities in which public opinion is in favor of this useful method of restraining the liquor evil."

HOTEL BURNED.

The hotel at Victoria Square, owned and occupied by Mr. Harper and son was burned to the ground early Monday morning. The shed was also burned, but by hard work on the part of the neighbors who soon gathered, the stable was saved. The fire was first observed about 3.30 a. m. Mr. Geo. Harper who sleeps down stairs heard a crackling noise at the back part of the house, and gave the alarm to the other members of the family who were asleep up-stairs. As many of the neighbors have telephones a number of people were soon on the spot, but in less than three-quarters of an hour, the large hotel, which was a frame building, was almost level with the ground. Some of the furniture was saved, but very little of the clothing. Mr. Wm. Harper had all his clothing burned except one everyday suit. There was some insurance on the building and contents, but as the house was well furnished the loss will be considerable.

Nearly every number on the programme called for an encore and the artists cheerfully responded in every case. The concert was another evidence that a programme can be high-class, patriotic and particularly humorous without a semblance of vulgarity.
