John Hickson was heard under oath
re damage to his sheep worried by
dogs during night of 14th inst. Two
sheep were killed, a thoroughbred Shrop-
shire ram and a well bred ewe, which
he valued at \$25.
Jas. Cosgrove swore he had six
sheep killed by dogs two on the night
of the 8th and four on the night of
the 10th—one ram, two ewes, and
three ewe lambs—which he valued at
\$50; also eight worried, which he put
at \$10—\$80 in all.
Padget—Nigh—that J. Hickson be
paid two-thirds the value of his sheep
killed \$16.66 and Mr. Cosgrove \$40 for
6 killed and 8 injured.
Jas. Penny was heard asking that
ditch be opened on the 8th con., in
