**DR. MCLEAN FOR CENTRE
YORK.**

The largest and most enthusiastic
convulsion ever held in Centre York
was that in Thornhill last Saturday
when Dr. P. D. McLean of Woodbridge
received the Liberal nomination for
the House of Commons, the vacancy
being made by the appointment of
Mr. Arch. Campbell, the former mem-
ber, to the Senate. Victoria Hall was
packed, every polling subdivision was
largely represented, and never was the
unanimity and enthusiasm of Centre
York more apparent than when Dr.
McLean rose to accept the nomination.

Those nominated were: Dr. McLean,
Woodbridge; A. F. Wilson, Markham;
G. W. Verral, Weston; L. Annis, Scar-
boro, and A. J. Anderson, Toronto
Junction. After making brief speeches
in which earnest, constant work until
the close of the poll was urged all
withdrew except Mr. Wilson and Dr.
McLean.

After a vote was taken the chairman,
Mr. Walter Scott, announced that Dr.
McLean had won by a substantial
majority. Mr. Wilson at once rose
and moved that the resolution be
made unanimous which was carried
with much enthusiasm. Dr. McLean
thanked Mr. Wilson and those present
for their generous support, and ex-
pressed his belief that with the help
of his friends Centre York would remain
in the ranks of the party supporting
Sir Wilfred Laurier.

Rousing speeches were afterwards
made by Senator Campbell, F. G. In-
wood, Hon. G. P. Graham, and H. H.
Dewart.

A series of resolutions were passed,
expressing regret that the riding was
deprived of the services of Hon. Arch.
Campbell as its representative in the
Commons; expressing confidence in
Sir Wilfred Laurier and his cabinet;
expressing confidence in Hon. A. G.
McKay, the new Ontario Leader; and
expressing regret at the death of the
former President of the Association.
Mr. M. Naughton of Elgin Mills, and
of deep sympathy with the bereaved
family.

The Convention closed with cheers
for the King, the leaders, and the
candidate.

ident, in the chair.
