VILLAGE COUNCIL.

The regular meeting of the Council was held in the Council Chamber on Tuesday evening.

All the members present. Minutes of last regular meeting read and confirmed.

Representatives from the curling and hockey clubs were present and addressed the Council with a view to making arrangements for the use of the rink during the ensuing winter.

Councillor Sanderson, who was appointed at the last meeting of the Council to investigate the case of the late Mrs. Lyons, reported that she had been removed to the Western Hospital, Toronto, where she, after some weeks, died, and also that she had left funds to the amount of \$43.02 in the hands of a friend, who handed them, through Councillor Sanderson, to the Village Council. As the Council had accepted the responsibility of caring for Mrs. Lyons during her sickness, it was moved by Councillor Nicholls and seconded by Councillor Trench that Councillor Sanderson's report be received and adopted, that the funds referred to be handed to the Treasurer and that he be instructed to pay out of the said funds the bills which have been sent to the Council on account of Mrs. Lyons' sickness, and to hold the balance until called for.—Carried.

A communication was read from Mr. John Palmer, on which action was deferred.

On motion, a committee of the whole Council was appointed to interview Mr. Palmer in reference to the fire hall. Councillors Barker and Sanderson were appointed to see that the fire tanks were filled with water.

It was moved that the Curling Club have the use of the rink on the same terms as last year, the nights of play to be Tuesdays and Fridays.—Carried.

It was moved that the Hockey Club have the use of the rink on Monday and Wednesday nights from 8 to 10, for \$1.50 per night.—Carried.

On motion the By-law Committee was instructed to bring in a by-law at the next meeting of the Council to amend the present snow by-law. The Council appointed Mr. A. G. Savage to act as Poll Clerk at the next municipal elections.

The Clerk was instructed to write Newton Bros., expressing the Council's appreciation of their generous assistance in the improvement of the roadway on Centre street east.

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NO MONEY AND NO FRIENDS

A Sad Story of Consumption in a Canadian Town

The Local Hospital Unable to Care for the Patient, and the query is What to Do?

In a little booklet issued by the National Sanitarium Association under whose auspices has been established the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives, we have the story told of a sad case of consumption.

A young woman, apparently friendless, came in on a train reaching Fort William, and immediately procured work as a domestic. A doctor was called in to examine her case, as she appeared to be a consumptive, and she was at once pronounced a bad case of tuberculosis.

She was placed in the small local hospital of the town, and everything possible for the moment is being done to help the patient.

But writing to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, the Secretary of the Board of Health asks: "Is it possible to make room for this patient in the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives. The local hospital is crowded for room, and there is really no place for this poor girl."

Continuing, the Fort William official adds "I may say that as far as being able to pay is concerned, she, as far as we can learn, has no friends who can afford to pay for her in an institution."

It is to meet just such cases as these that the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives has been opened. The official reports of the past year show that more than half the patients who entered the institution were absolutely free—their maintenance not costing them a single farthing. The others only paid a nominal sum ranging from \$1.50 to \$6.00 a week, only a few paying the larger amount. The average of each patient was less than 60 cents a day. The actual cost of maintenance to the institution is over \$9.00 a week so that our readers can readily see how strong a case is made out by the Trustees in their appeal to make provision for just such a patient as that from Fort William—only one of scores who are constantly seeking admission.

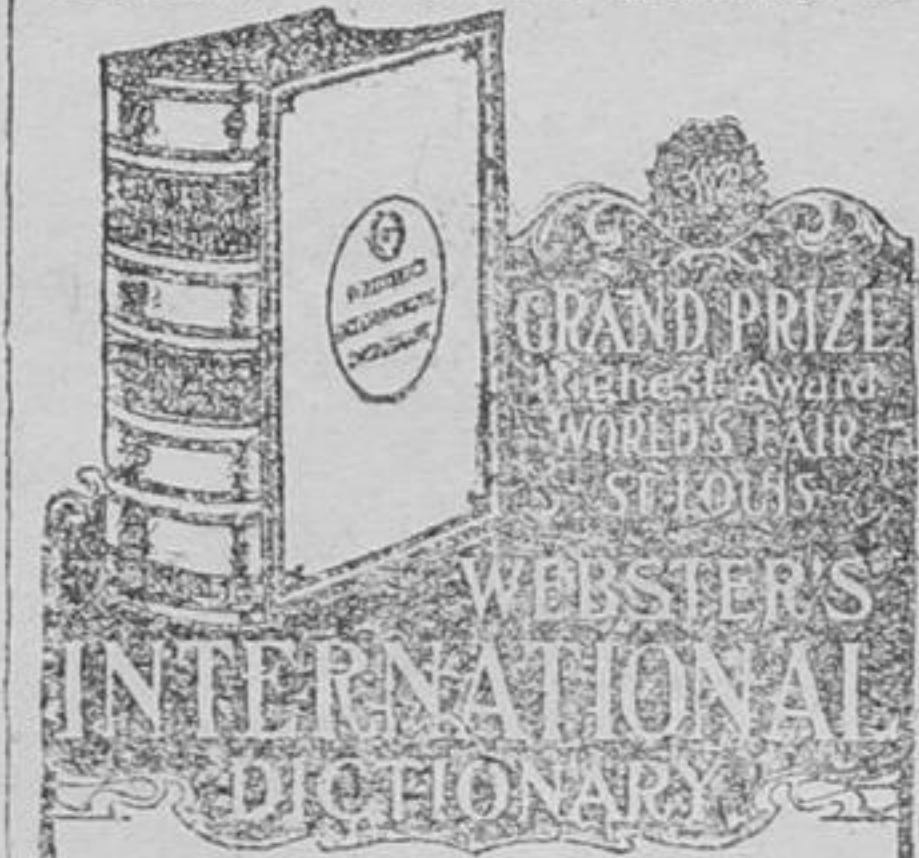
