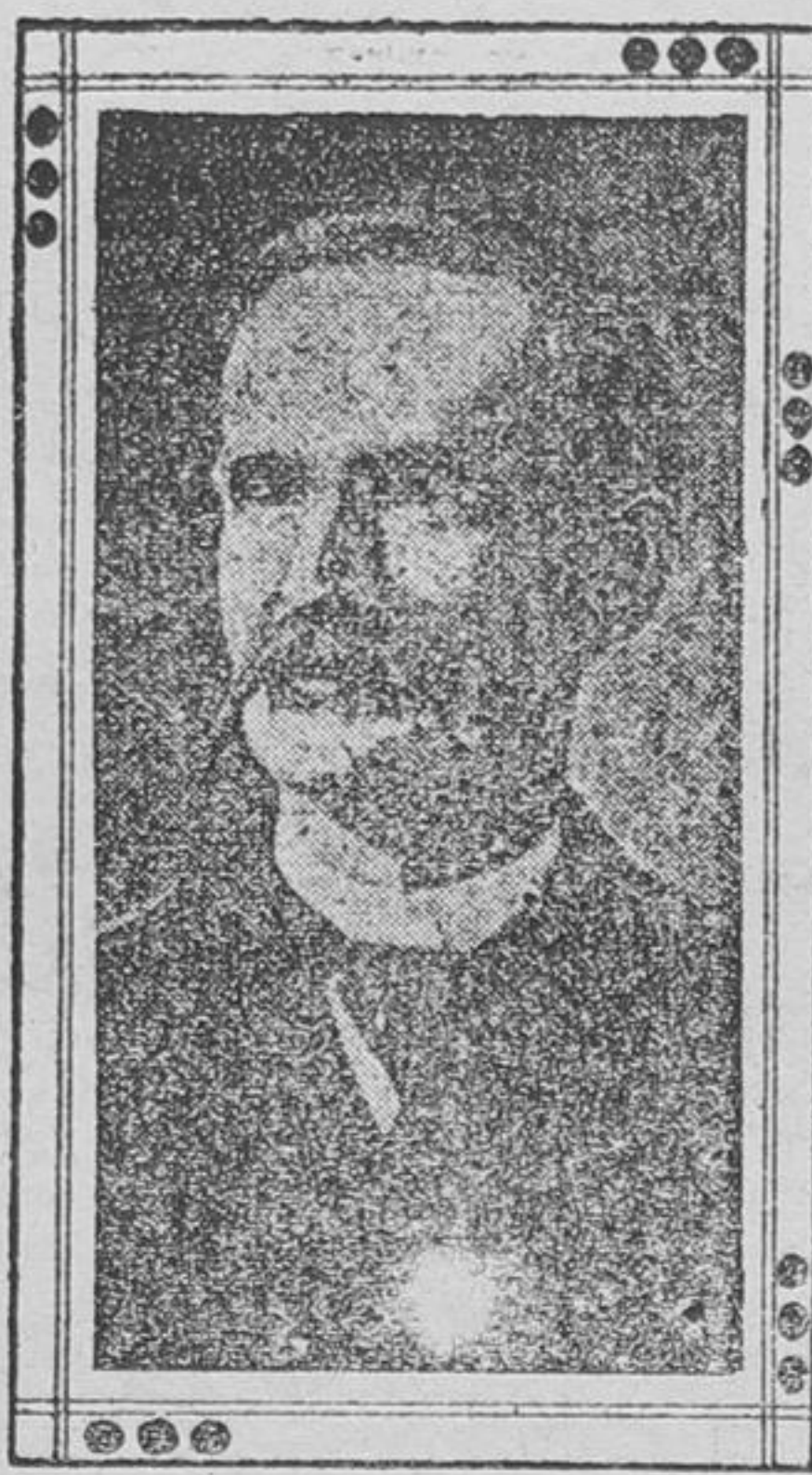

DEATH AND BURIAL.

Deep sorrow is felt in the sudden
death of Rev. C. L. Wisswasser, pas-
tor of the Lutheran church at Sher-
wood. Deceased had had an attack
of pneumonia, which kept him from
conducting his usual services for sev-
eral Sundays, but he seemed to grow
stronger and had resumed his labors,
preaching in his own church, also at
Unionville and Butoville on the
Sunday previous to his death. Friday
afternoon he drove to Richmond Hill
by way of Maple, but while on his
way home he was seized with violent
pains, and lived only a short time
after reaching his home.

The funeral took place from the
Parsonage Tuesday afternoon, and
was largely attended by members of
his congregation, and by friends from
near and far. The church was appro-
priately draped for the solemn occa-
sion, and many a tear was seen to fall
as the friends looked upon the face of
their beloved pastor for the last time
on this side of eternity. The choir
sang the very hymns that had been
selected by the deceased for last Sun-
day's services, and it was remarked
that the selections were strangely ap-
propriate for his own funeral. Short
but impressive addresses were given
by Rev. Mr. Back of Eglinton, Rev.
Mr. McKinnon of Woodbridge, Rev.
Mr. Jones of Maple, and Rev. Mr.
Brace of Richmond Hill—all members
of the Ministerial Association, of
which association deceased had been
an esteemed member. The speakers
were pleased to bear testimony to his
cheerful disposition, his Christian
hopefulness, his strong religious con-
victions and his scholarly attainments.
He was a friend, good and true, and
he had the welfare of his congregation
at heart. Surely, said one of the
brethren, a prince has fallen, but his
life should be a blessing to those who
learned to know his genuine worth.
Sympathy profound is expressed on
every hand for the bereaved widow
and children who are left to mourn
the loss.
