RICHMOND HILL, ONT., Jan. 23, 1908

Liberals were elected in South Huron and Stanstead, Quebec, to Parliament yesterday. In South Huron Mr. McLean's majority was 134, and in Stanstead Mr. Lovell secured a majority of 273.

The trip to Japan of Hon. Mr. Lemieux, accompanied by Mr. W. L. M. King, has apparently been a success. The minister reported in the House of Commons Tuesday that assurances had been given that Japanese emigration to Canada would be restricted, that emigration companies will be suppressed, and that emigration of Japanese by way of Hawaii will cease altogether. Such a reassuring message looking to the settlement of a great and dangerous international question must be received with unqualified satisfaction all over Canada.

The Senate is not a popular institution in this country. That fact was made more evident in a discussion in the House of Commons Monday night. Three different motions were placed before the House, one being to reform the Senate, and another asking for its abolition. It is now generally conceded that the Upper Chamber has been a failure, and that as at present constituted it will almost invariably side with its political party whether the latter is in office or not. Experience teaches that the Senate does not act as a check to hasty legislation. Few people would care to send the present Senators to their homes, yet many are free to admit that the paying of senators is a useless expense on the country. It is to be hoped that some good will result from the recent discussion.

VAUGHAN COUNCIL.

The inaugural meeting of Vaughan council was held on the 13th of January.

The following members-elect having executed the declaration of qualification and of office, took their seats and proceeded to business: reeve, Isaac Devins; deputy-reeve, D. C. Longhouse; J. A. Cameron, Wm. Thomas, and J. S. McNair, councillors.

Several communications were received including one from Mr. Little, manager of the Sterling Bank, asking a portion of the business of the township with that institution.

A resolution was passed authorizing the payment of a large number of gravel and road accounts.

Thomas—Cameron—That the treasurer be authorized to pay to J. Ross Robertson for the Sick Children's Hospital, the sum of \$10.—Carried.

McNair—Longhouse—That the clerk be authorized to subscribe for six copies of Municipal World for the use of the council and clerk.—Carried.

Cameron—Thomas—That Archibald Cummings be appointed caretaker of the Township Hall, stable, and grounds for 1908.—Carried.

Longhouse—McNair—That this council hold its regular meetings on the second Tuesday of each month, at 10 a. m., during the remainder of the year (except the month of May, when said meeting will be held on Tuesday, the 26th; also the June meeting to be held on June 16, and during August and September meetings to be held at 1 p. m.). The clerk was instructed to have 100 copies printed for distribution, with the names of fence viewers and pound keepers included in said notice.—Carried.

Longhouse—Thomas—That the treasurer pay the following general account: Ed. Brown, printing 300 copies minutes and treasurer's statements, \$57.60.—Carried.

P. P., be requested to present the petition and support the bill in the Local House.—Carried.

Cameron—Thomas—That the application in reference to the Sterling Bank be laid over for further consideration.—Carried.

Wm. Carruthers applied for collect- orship for west half at a salary of \$85.
Nigh—Morrison—That the Treas. of S. S. No. 16 be instructed to pay Edmund Clendenning the sum of \$3.34; also Jno. Meyer, \$1.15; being excess of school taxes paid by said parties on account of being assessed in the wrong school section.

On motion the clerk was instructed to return to several people \$1 each, for dog tax.

A by-law was passed appointing a Board of Health: W. H. Lapp, reeve, C. H. Stiver, clerk, by virtue of their office, and J. H. Mitchel, one year; David James, 2 years, and Wm. Monkman, 3 years; Robt. Campbell, Sanitary Inspector, salary \$2 a day when employed and 5 cents a mile mileage.

A by-law was passed providing for the maintenance of Yonge street between Markham and Vaughan providing for the sum of \$600 to be appropriated, and that J. E. Francis be commissioner at \$25 per year, he to report from time to time on all accounts due for material and labor.

Padget—Kirk—That the Reeve be appointed commissioner to represent municipality to adjust account between Police villages of Unionville and Mount Joy and Township of Markham.

Padget—Kirk—That Mr. Nigh be a commissioner to ask for tenders for 25, 000 feet 4 inch cedar, 16 feet long.

Morrison—Nigh—That \$10 be granted to National Sanitarium.

Padget—Kirk—That \$10 be granted the Sick Children's Hospital.

Nigh—Morrison—That we refund Ambrose Pennock 50c overcharge on statute labor.

Kirk—Padget—That Geo. Hooper be paid \$11.90 for 119 yds. gravel.

Nigh—Kirk—That Mr. Lapp and Mr. Morrison be appointed a printing committee.

By resolution the clerk was instructed to pay a large number of general accounts.

Kirk—Padget—That the treasurer be and is hereby authorised to pay each deputy returning officer the sum of \$3 and mileage; each poll clerk \$2; each constable \$1, and for each polling booth \$3.

Morrison—Nigh—That the clerk be instructed to order six copies of the Municipal World for the use of the council.

A by-law was passed:—Appointing assessors as follows:—Wm. Brown, A. S. Clarry, east half. Auditors—J. F. Davidson and Walter Scott.

Kirk—Nigh—That Mr. Nigh be commissioner to enquire into the cutting of certain trees on siding between lots 30 and 31, con. 2, and report at next meeting of council.

Council adjourned to meet on Saturday, Feb. 8th, at 11 a. m.
