REMINISCENCES OF 1837.

The Toronto Daily Star of the 27th instant records the death of Mrs. Martha Ann Beswick, of Toronto, daughter of the late Mr. David Wilson, and says "As a child, Mrs. Beswick and her sister, Mrs. Thos. Medcalf, who died a year ago, carried despatches from the military headquarters in Toronto to the look-out quarters at Colonel Wells' house. To avoid the Mackenzieites, the two little Wilson girls went out ostensibly to "pick berries," and Mrs. Beswick, being the younger, carried the despatches sewed in the back of her dress.

The Globe of the 17th Nov., 1906, records the death of Mrs. Thomas Metcalf, and relates the part she took in reference to the rebellion of 1837, saying "She was employed in carrying news to the men in the field. On one occasion she conveyed news to Col. Wells and other loyal leaders by hiding the notes in her stockings."

The Palladium, a Toronto newspaper of the 14th February, 1838, mentions another young beroine, named Cordelia De Grassi-"The maid of the Don"-as having traversed the woods, alone, to Montgomery's and the headquarters of the rebels, and back again, with information of their councils, movements and numbers, several times, rendering

very important services." It is remarkable that Sir Francis Bond Head, in his celebrated "Narra- 31-2 tive," omitted to refer to the eminent services of the Wilson family, as also those of Cordelia De Grassi-De mortuis nil nisi verum.
