The annual Seed Fair under the auspices of the Richmond Hill & Yonge St. Agricultural Society will be held in the Lorne Hall, on Tuesday, Feb. 11. Exhibits of grains, seeds, potatoes, apples, and pears will be received. All exhibits must be in position not later than 1 p. m. Mr. Lockie Wilson, Supt. of Agricultural Societies, and other speakers to be supplied by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, will be present and give addresses on agricultural and horticultural subjects. MR. MILLER'S SUDDEN DEATH.

Deepest sympathy is felt for the Misses Miller in the unexpected death of their father, the late Henry Miller, which took place last Saturday. U. and other friends sent floral offerings, and every sympathy was shown to the bereaved members of the family. Deceased was in his 77th year. He is survived by three daughters, Mary, Ellen, and Annie, one brother Andrew, in Thornhill, and a sister, Mrs. W. Gohn, also of Thornhill.
