RICHMOND HILL, ONT., Feb. 27, 1908

MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

All the members were present on Saturday, Feb. 15, when the reeve took the chair.

Communications were received:

From T. H. Lennox on behalf of Chas. Perry of York Mills who broke his leg by coming in contact with a wagon that was left on Yonge street, at Thornhill, on Halloween and claiming that Markham township equally with the township of Vaughan was liable for damages.

From J. B. McLean, clerk of Vaughan, requesting Markham township to appoint a committee to meet a committee appointed by Vaughan to consider the claim for damages of Chas. Perry for broken leg, and Thos. Ford of Newtonbrook for injuries to horse received through broken wagon being left on Yonge street.

From R. J. Cunningham, certifying that Kelly Bros. are entitled to refund of \$3.50 statute labor tax, they having performed statute labor and paid it in taxes also.

Mr. Robt. Coulson the reeve of Stouffville was heard to drain at east end of village on the 10th, which Mr. Goulson claimed was of some benefit to Markham township, and offered to accept \$80 in settlement. The cost of building the drain in Markham township some 75 rods was \$111.

Nigh—Morrison—that the treasurer pay the Corporation of Stouffville the sum of \$70, being our share of ditch for outlet on 10th con. and that the former resolution passed Sept. 14th, be rescinded.

John Weldrick was heard on oath claiming damages for two sheep killed and six injured by dogs on the night of Jan. 20th, valued at \$30.

E. Sisley had one sheep killed and three injured the same night which he valued at \$22.

The treasurer was ordered to pay two-thirds the amount of their claim as provided by statute.

Nigh—Morrison—that Councillors Padget and Kirk be appointed a committee to meet the committee appointed by Vaughan to inquire into claim for damages for accident in Yonge street.

A by-law was passed authorizing the reeve and treasurer to borrow from the Standard Bank a sum not exceeding \$10,000 at 5 per cent. per annum to meet current expenditure.

Padget—Nigh—that R. J. Ressor be paid the sum of \$4 refund of statute labor tax paid twice.

Kirk—Padget—that Jas. Tricker be paid \$5 for opening ditch between lots 10 and 11, con. 3.

Nigh—Morrison—that Hugh Boyd be refunded \$1.00, wrongfully assessed for dog.

Moved by Mr. Nigh seconded by Mr. Kirk, that whereas application has been made to the Ontario Legislature by the Artesian Water Supply Company for a charter to sink wells and divert the streams in the southern part of Whitechurch as a source of water supply for towns and villages to the west and south; and whereas, in the opinion of this council such action would seriously affect the water supply in the streams running through the township;

Therefore be it resolved that this council protest to the Legislature against the granting of any such charter, and further, that in case the proposed bill is pushed, that this council as a body wait on the Legislature and use every possible means to defeat the said bill.

Nigh—Morrison—that we refund Reuben Lunan \$14.33, being statute labor for Chas. Hemmingway and \$13.88 taxes on lot in Mount Joy wrongfully assessed to Albert Clonning.

Nigh—Morrison—that we pay 12 1/2 cents per hour for shovelling snow, the same to be paid on certificate from the road overseer.

Council adjourned to meet on Saturday, March 14th.
