THE INDUSTRIAL HOME, COUNTY OF YORK.

A Grand Jury has made the follow-
ing report relative to the York County
Industrial Home, in their presentment
to Judge Winchester:—
"To those who are in doubt as to
whether it is advisable to have old
peoples' homes placed under the con-
trol of the municipality, we would
strongly urge upon them to visit the
Industrial Home for the County of
York at Newmarket.
There we found an excellent build-
ing, warm comfortable and homelike,
containing fifty-two men and twenty
women. The buildings cost over \$33,-
000.00 and the land, which covers over
fifty acres, cost over \$5,000.00. Every
old man or woman who has been a
resident of the County for over two
years, and who is in need, and who re-
quires a home can seek admittance
here without money and without
price. They have a fine garden, a
good orchard and plenty to eat and
drink.
There is no begging or asking the
charitably disposed to help them to
pay expenses. All expenses are paid
out of the Treasury of the County.
They raise more than they need of farm
produce and still have some to sell.
The inmates are happy and comfort-
able and the management is conduct-
ed in the most businesslike manner.
With this as an illustration in front
of us we again strongly urge Provin-
cial Government and the Council of
the City of Toronto to consider our
recommendation of not allowing their
public charities to pass out of their
hands, but to control them either in
part or in whole."
