CAPT. WALLACE AGAIN.

At a meeting of the Centre York Conservatives held in Toronto last Saturday Capt. T. G. Wallace was selected as their standard-bearer for the next Dominion election. Altogether four nominations were made, namely: Capt. Wallace, A. Ward Milne, W. H. Pugsley, and R. O. Harvey. The last two named resigned, but Mr. Milne insisted that his name should be on the ballot. Capt. Wallace was elected by a large majority. Although the convention was plainly overwhelmingly for Mr. Wallace, Mr. Milne stoutly maintained that he had the right to the honor. He said that he had lost, by a very close vote, the nomination for the bye-election held in the riding last fall, and he charged that his defeat at that convention was largely due to irregularities. As he had not received fair treatment then he asked the delegates to do him justice by giving him the nomination. After the result of the voting was made known speeches were made by the candidate, Rev. Peter Campbell and others. Capt. Wallace was defeated by Dr. McLean at the bye-election last December by the close majority of 26.
