GOOD ROADS ASS'N.

Mr. W. H. Pugsley, reeve of this village, has been again elected President of the Ontario Good Roads Association. At the annual convention of the Association, Mr. A. W. Campbell, deputy-minister of public works, explained the workings of the Good Roads Act and the steps which any county council should take in adopting the county road system. During the last ten years the municipalities of the province had spent \$10,000,000 on roads, and if this had been handled efficiently it would have been sufficient for good road beds for ten years. The great thing was to have a competent road engineer and a proper inspection of the construction work. Three or four miles of road well done would be the best way of converting the rate-payers.
