MR. SLATER'S FUNERAL.

Deceased was widely known and greatly respected as was evidenced by the long procession of vehicles driven by warm friends who had attended the funeral from Toronto and all parts of the county to show their respect and esteem to the memory of the departed. Service was conducted at the house by the pastor of the Presbyterian church, and after interment in the Buttonville Cemetery another short service was held in the Methodist church. The late Mr. Slater was a native of Markham township and had occupied many positions of trust both in the township and the county. He had twice held the position of reeve, and was an ex-warden of York county. He is survived by two sisters.

## Synopsis of Canadian North-

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

MY even numbered sections of A Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewar and Adverta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of orequarter section of 160 acres, more of

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by proxy may, how ever, be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under obe

of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence ppon and cultivation of the land in

each year for three years. (2) A homesteader may if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownerships in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader! has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles ha a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the meas-

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence daties in accordance with the above while living with par-

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.
