News Notes.

Professor N. R. Carmichael of Queen's College, Kingston, died at the residence of his brother-in-law, Mr. J. L. Jenkins, King, Wednesday, July 8. Funeral Friday from the home of his father, Rev. Dr. Carmichael.

A fatal accident occurred on the 9th inst. on the farm of Oliver Burton, 9th con. Vaughan, near Woodbridge. His little son, six years old, was on the wagon while they were loading hay. The horses started suddenly, overbalancing the loader of the hay. As he fell the fork pierced the child's breast. He died shortly after.
