RETURN TICKETS.

For some time past the Metropolitan Railway would sell return tickets only between Toronto and any other station. Commencing on the 25th of August they now issue return tickets between all stations, provided the tickets are purchased at the stations. The new arrangement will be an improvement over the old, though the reduction is only slight. Return tickets are now issued from Richmond Hill at the following rates: to Thornhill, 15 cents; Toronto, 50 cents; Bond Lake, 15 cents; Aurora, 35 cents; Newmarket, 55 cents; Jackson's Point, \$1.50.

DRILLING FOR GAS.

Our reporter visited the farm of Mr. Lewis Page, lot 33, 1st con. Vaughan, last Friday and watched the men drilling for gas. The men and the engine were doing good work, sinking the drill each day deeper and deeper. Although considerably over 400 feet beneath the surface the men have not yet struck the rock. They have had some trouble with quicksand and for the previous few days had not made very much progress, but new casing has been secured, and it is hoped the work will now be more satisfactory. If necessary the company will drill to the depth of 1,600 feet though it is hoped a good flow of gas will be reached not so far from the surface.
