**EAST YORK EXPENSES.**  
The following paragraph appeared  
in Monday's World relative to the  
expenses of each candidate at the recent  
East York Election:

The candidates in the last provincial  
election in East York have filed a  
statement of their expenses. In the  
case of James Walter Curry the  
amount is given as \$491.30, made up  
as follows: Rent of committee rooms  
and payment of caretakers, \$175; ad-  
vertising, \$207.20; rent of halls,  
\$53.50; and personal expenses, \$55;

placed at \$1964.35, made up in this  
way: Wages, advertising, rent of six  
committee rooms, printing and station-
