FUNERAL OF REV. MR. GRANT.

The funeral of the late Rev. Jas. A. Grant, pastor of the Presbyterian churches at Richmond Hill and Thornhill, took place Thursday afternoon, August 13. The remains were taken into the church here, where a funeral service was held. Rev. Dr. Gilray presided. The following clergymen were present, most of whom took part in the services: Rev. Messrs. Colborne, Amos, Carmichael, Dr. Parsons, Back, and others. The funeral was very large, testifying to the respect and esteem in which Mr. Grant was held. The Sons of Scotland camp were also present to show respect to their deceased brother. Rev. Dr. Carmichael represented the Presbytery and gave an impressive address. He touching-

ly referred to the earlier life of deceased, his well-merited popularity at college, his inexhaustible fund of humor, his faithfulness in the discharge of every duty, his cheerful, helpful life, his devotion to his wife and family, and his kindness to everybody. After the service the remains were interred in Mount Pleasant cemetery, many of the friends accompanying the mourners on the private car to the last resting place of the deceased. Many a tear was seen to fall as the car moved away, and those who knew him well realized that they had seen their beloved friend and pastor for the last time on this side of the grave. The deepest sympathy goes out to the widow and children in this great bereavement.

MEMORIAL SERVICES.

The prayer service in the Methodist church on Thursday evening last was of a memorial nature, and was largely attended. Rev. E. H. Tove gave a brief talk on the words "Be ye therefore followers of them who thro' faith and patience inherit the promises," making a feeling reference to the late Rev. J. A. Grant. In the course of his remarks Mr. Tove said "Sadly, we, to-night mourn the loss of one whose purity of life, breadth of sympathy and willingness to serve caused him to be loved by all. You have not been robbed of your pastor it is true, but we weep with those of our sister church in this sad hour, for we too have suffered a great loss in the departure of the one who was always willing to aid us and to minister unto our needs. His sympathy was too large, his love too great, his interest in the welfare of mankind was too broad to be confined within church walls, and denominationalism never prevented his ministries of love to those who needed comfort and cheer. In recognition of his willing services from time to time our League is officially represented in the service of this hour. We feel our loss, and our prayers now ascend on behalf of those who have been compelled to say farewell to a loving husband and a faithful father, and who return to a lonely home. But louder than any note of sadness; yes high above any sound of weeping we hear the song of victory and triumph. Hark! methink I can hear now, those mystic voices as from the realm of "somewhere" they proclaim

Servant of God well done,
