**Markham Township Council.**  
Council met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Saturday, the 15th inst. with all the members present, and Reeve Lapp in the chair.  
Communications were read from:—  
T. H. Lennox, re claim damage to Mitchell's horse, stating that unless settlement were made at once a writ would be issued.  
From County Clerk Ramsden, with requisition for County purposes for year 1908:—For general purposes, \$6,053.57; Industrial Home, \$1079.62; Court House debentures, \$579.61.  
From Thos. Lane, notifying council that he would not accept less than 25 cents per yard for gravel from his pit at German Mills, and claiming it was cheap at the price as one yard was worth more than two from any other pit.  
From J. B. McLean, Clerk of Vaughan re Dr. Scrivener, V. S., claim, and asking Markham Council to meet Vaughan Council at Richmond Hill on August 22nd, at 1 p.m.  
From John E. Thompson, commissioner of Industries and Publicity, Toronto, re improved suburban service, and asking the council to be represented at a conference to be held in the City Hall, Toronto, on Aug. 20th.  
The assessment roll for 1908 shows the total assessment for the township to be \$3,269,776. The assessment for the east half, is \$1,591,845; west half, \$1,677,931; Unionville Police Village, \$64,880; Mount Joy Police Village, \$49,475.

A large number of road accounts, general accounts, and accounts for shovelling snow were on motion ordered to be paid.  
Nigh—Kirk—That Mr. Padget be commissioner to put in new bridge, opposite lot 32, con. 2.  
A by-law was passed appointing collectors of taxes:—W. F. Nicholls, west half, and Reuben Lunau, east half, at \$100 each salary; the collection to furnish surety of \$20,000 each.  
A by-law was passed to levy rate for county, township, and school purposes as follows:—County, \$7713, at 2.04 mills; Township rate, levy \$611, at 3 mills; Unionville Police Village, levy \$259.95, at 4 mills; Mount Joy Police Village, \$148.42, at 3 mills Public school rate, as per requisitions.  
Messrs. Haiper, Isaac, Adam and Milne appeared before the council asking for a grant toward Markham Agricultural Society.

Nigh—Morrison—that we give a grant of \$25 to Unionville Public Library.  
Kirk—Morrison—that this council grant the sum \$75 to Markham Agricultural Society towards new buildings.  
Council adjourned to meet on Saturday, Sept. 12th at 10 a. m.

**HIGH COURT MEETING.**  
The annual meeting of the High Court of Central Ontario of the Independent Order of Foresters, held at Meaford last week, was satisfactory in every particular. The hundreds of delegates received a hearty welcome by the town, which was richly decorated with evergreens, flags, and streamers inscribed with words of "Welcome" and "Good Will."  
Tuesday, at two o'clock sharp, High Chief Ranger Cowan brought down his gavel and began proceedings. Nearly every Court of the 202 Courts in the jurisdiction was represented. All of the officers of the High Court were present. From the report of the High Chief Ranger it appears: That the whole Order has 4500 Courts, and a membership on the 31st December last of 257,000. Central Ontario has 18,000 members, while the whole province has 55,000. During the year the Order as a whole paid out in benefits of various kinds over \$2,000,000; the accumulated funds at present are over \$12,250,000. The growth of the Order in Central Ontario during the year has been satisfactory. 2942 applications having been received; 151 joined the great majority and their beneficiaries received \$168,665, in benefits; 113 members in the jurisdiction reached the old age limit who pay no further assessments and receive annually one tenth of their benefit.  
Brampton was selected as the place of meeting for 1909, the date of which will be fixed by the High Standing Committee.
