

Everything points to a general Dominion election this fall. Both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. R. L. Borden have arranged their campaign tours, and there is much activity in political circles.

Ontario Liberals 39, Conservatives 47, Quebec, Liberals 54, Conservatives 11; Nova Scotia, Liberals 17, Conservative 1; New Brunswick, Liberals 8, Conservatives 5; Manitoba, Liberals 7, Conservatives 3; Saskatchewan Liberals 5, Conservative 1; Alberta Liberals 2, Conservatives 2; British Columbia Liberals 7, Conservatives 0; Prince Edward Island, Liberal 1, Conservatives 3; Yukon 1 Conservative. Total: Liberals 149, Conservatives 74. Liberal majority, 66.

RESULTS OF CO-OPERATIVE EXPERIMENTS WITH AUTUMN-SOWN CROPS.

Three hundred and seven farmers throughout Ontario conducted experiments with autumn-sown crops during the past year. Reports have been received from twenty-six of the counties of the province.

Winter Wheat—Three varieties of winter wheat were distributed last autumn to those farmers who wished to test some of the leading varieties on their own farms.

Winter Rye—Of the two varieties of winter rye distributed in the autumn of 1907, the Mammoth White stood first in average yield of grain with 34 bushels, and the Common second, with 28.6 bushels per acre.

Fertilizers with Winter Wheat—In the co-operative experiments with different manures applied in the spring of the year, the average yields of grain per acre for the past five years are as follows: Mixed Fertilizer, 27.6 bus.; Nitrate of Soda, 25.8 bus.;

Fodder Crops—In each of the five years, the seed of Hairy Vetches and of Winter Rye has been distributed throughout Ontario for co-operative experiments in testing these crops for fodder purposes.

As long as the supply lasts, material will be distributed free of charge in the order in which the applications are received from Ontario farmers wishing to experiment and to report the results of any one of the following tests:

1, three varieties of Winter Wheat; 2, two varieties of Winter Rye; 3, five fertilizers with Winter Wheat; 4, Autumn-sown Spring Wheat.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

ANY even numbered sections of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 13 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownerships in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.
