**Wolves on the Canadian Northern Ontario  
Railway.—Hunters Aroused, and  
Want Them Exterminated.**

The numerous packs of wolves around  
Bolger and the Magnetawan River  
has aroused the hunters to request the  
Canadian Northern Ontario Railway  
to organize a wolf hunt for the  
purpose of exterminating them. They  
claim that if something is not done  
the wolves will gradually kill all  
Deer, which are now so plentiful and  
afford such splendid sport along the  
line.

It will take between 70 and 100 men  
to conduct the drives, and if this number  
can be got together the Company  
will arrange for the hunt sometime in  
the month of February. The Govern-  
ment bounty of \$15 on each wolf  
should be a sufficient inducement.  
The proposed scene of operation is so  
easily accessible that parties leaving  
Toronto in the morning will be in  
camp the same afternoon. If carried  
out the wolf hunt will afford a splendid  
winter outing with plenty of excitement.
