SEED FAIR.

The most successful Seed Fair yet held in this place was that of Friday last held in the Lorne Hall under the auspices of the Richmond Hill Agricultural Society. The hall was filled with representative farmers from the surrounding districts, there was a large exhibit of grain, seed and potatoes, and the addresses given were of a practical and interesting nature. The judging was done by Mr. Geo. Keith, the well-known seed-man of Toronto, and Mr. Cecil Klinck of the Agricultural College. A large amount of grain for seed changed hands, and everybody was free to admit that a seed fair at this season of the year is in the interests of the farmers who wish to improve the quality and quantity of their grain and roots.

After the judging was over the meeting was called to order, Mr. H. A. Nicholls acting as chairman.

Mr. A. J. Reynolds was the first speaker. His remarks were well received, and carried weight from the fact that he has been for many years a practical agriculturist.

Mr. Keith referred to York as the greatest grain producing county in the province. He gave the results of many kinds of grain tested at the Agricultural College, showing that that institution is doing an excellent work.

Short addresses were afterwards given by Mr. Keith, Mr. G. Padget, Mr. W. H. Clubine and others. A hearty vote of thanks moved by Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Clubine, was tendered the speakers and the judges for their valuable assistance. The following is a list of prize win-
