been taxed at \$152.02, and judgment
against townships for \$200.
Mr. Bailey was heard again re settle-
ment of claim for damages for alleged
injuries sustained last fall through fall
of bridge south of Unionville, and
wanted \$200 to settle.
Messrs. Nigh and Kirk interviewed
Mr. and Mrs. Bailey and reported they
had secured a settlement of his claim
for damages for \$140 on subject to ap-
proval of Council.
