IN MEMORIAM. Jacob Heise, who died on March 21, 1909, at the home of his sister, Mrs. D. W. Eyer, Richmond Hill, in his 80th year, was a twin brother of the late Christopher Heise of Victoria Square who died on the 19th of December last. He was born on the old homestead now owned by his nephew, H. R. Heise, Victoria Square, on Sept. 12, 1829, where he lived until his 31st year, when he was united in matrimony, on the 10th of Jan., 1860, to Margaret Smith of Reach Township, Ontario County, when he settled on lot 27, 2nd con. Markham, now owned by A. E. Williams. There was born unto them two sons and three daughters—Charlotte L. Heise residing with her aunt, Mrs. D. W. Eyer of Richmond Hill; Cecelia A. Heise who died at the home of her uncle D. V. Heise, Clarence Centre, N.Y., in her 18th year; Anna E. Heise who lives with her Uncle, John Smith of Reach; Eleazer W. Heise of Cal., and Elijah G. Heise of Memphis, Tenn. His wife preceded him to the spirit-world on the 9th of July, 1872. His remains were interred in the Heise Hill Cemetery, March 23, 1909, after a short service at the residence, conducted by Elder Abram Winger of the Vaughan appointment. He was a member of the Tunker Church of Canada, and was faithful until the Lord said "it is enough come up higher."
