To the Editor of THE LIBERAL: Dear Sir,-I am glad to know that my last letter was of sufficient importance to call forth comment in your editorial column, and an observation from "One Who Knows." In refer- village and vicinity:ence to this latter I wish to make a few remarks:-

1. It is not at all necessary that I STEAM COAL or another should have practical ex perience in the house-building of the village, to discern the need or be competent to speak.

2. The writer knows of larger places than Richmond Hill that have new houses to rent at \$6.00 a month and is informed that here, too, there are places let for this price, and so the Also Tile. assertion of "One who knows," that a house could not be built to rept at that price, is disproved.

3. Even if it were impossible to build and let at so low a price, seven or eight dollars could just as easily be got for a tidy place. People in Richmond Hill will pay \$10.00 for the thing they want as readily as people in any other place. But to say they would not before they have had a chance is hardly fair. Besides, those who come from cities and towns where rents are high, would regard \$10.00 as very low

4. It cannot be reasonably expected that those who come to reside here should build for themselves, especially if they are employed labor with no assurance of permanent residence. No town ever grew whose citizens were so unaggressive as to refuse to build accommodation for new comers. Toronto would probably be as Richmond Hill to-day, had this attitude been taken by its citizens.

5. Material and wages are not too high to build houses to rent in other places, not even in Dawson City, so that they can scarcely be out of reach
