

THE SENATE.

The recent debate in the House of Commons on the advisability of reforming or abolishing the Senate showed plainly that the second Chamber is not a popular institution. Some of the members expressed themselves in favor of rooting out the aged tree altogether, while others would only trim its branches. The Senate is supposed to act as a check on hasty legislation passed by the Commons, but experience teaches that members of that venerable body assist their political friends when the latter find themselves in tight corners, no matter which side may hold the balance of power for the time being. We are free to admit that the second Chamber includes some of the ablest and most worthy men in the Dominion, and we would not insinuate that they spend their time in useless discussions, but it is generally understood that the appointments are made as a reward for party service.

If the Senate is to continue—and it seems that the matter is shelved for at least another year—it is evident it must be brought more into harmony with public opinion. Everybody admits that some change is necessary, but few of those who express themselves seem to entertain similar opinions. In case the Senate is merely to be reformed perhaps the resolutions proposed by Senator R.W. Scott would be as feasible as any yet brought forward. Mr. Scott's proposition is to have two-thirds of the senators elected by the people, one-third to be appointed by the Crown, and in each case the term to be for seven years.

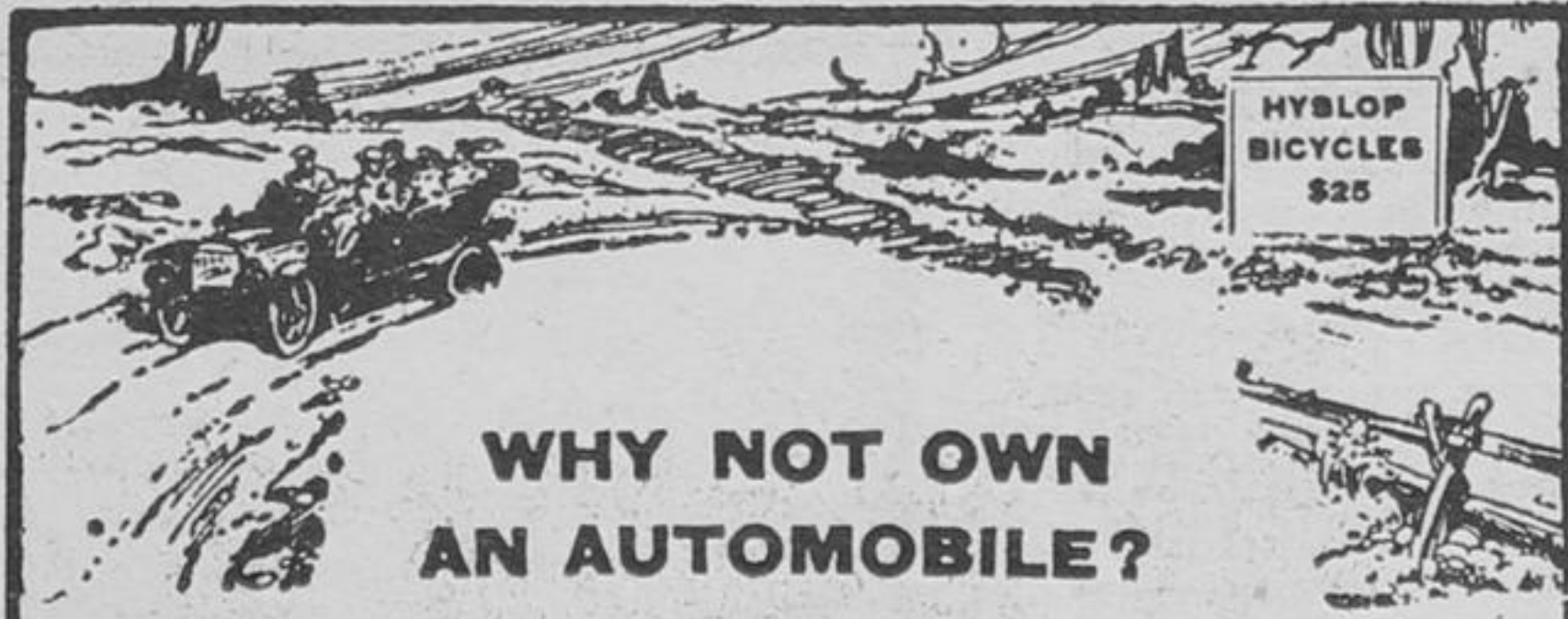
