The funeral of our late lamented and esteemed citizen, Mr. J. A. E. Switzer, will take place on Friday afternoon at 2. Service will be held in the Methodist Church, when several of the former ministers, old friends of the family, are expected to be present and take part in the service.

The Presbyterian congregation will resume worship in the auditorium of the church on next Sunday. The interior has just been beautifully retinted and varnished and presents quite a new and attractive appearance. Fine weather and renewed conditions should see the congregation present en masse at each service hereafter.

MR. SWITZER'S DEATH.

Another prominent citizen has crossed the bar. After a lingering illness, Mr. J. A. E. Switzer passed away early Tuesday morning, surrounded by his wife and daughters. Until a few years ago he seemed to have a splendid physical constitution which might have been expected to prolong, for several years to come, his term of life. But human foresight is fallible, and the span which might have been lengthened a few years longer, had reached its end. Although of a quiet and retiring disposition he was always willing and anxious to aid in any undertaking for the benefit of the village, and he will be greatly missed as a citizen, and particularly in the Methodist church. He was a member of the Royal Templars and the A. O. U. W. and was for many years prominently connected with the Board of Education, only resigning the position of secretary-treasurer a few months ago, owing to ill-health. He was recording steward for the Methodist circuit, had long been a class leader in the Church, and was superintendent in the Sabbath School until his health compelled him to retire from that position also. Mr. Switzer, who was born in the County of Peel, came to this village in 1872, and for three years was Principal of the Public School. In 1876 he married Elizabeth A., daughter of the late Wm. Atkinson, and in the same year became a member of the mercantile firm, afterwards known as Atkinson & Switzer. His industry, honesty and integrity could not fail to make his business career successful. The funeral will take place to-morrow (Friday) at 2 o'clock.

Mr. Petch, one of the conductors on the Metropolitan Railway, happened with a serious accident last Friday. At the C. P. R. crossing the hand rail at the rear of a car gave way when he caught hold of it, throwing him back on the pavement. He received a fracture of the skull, and was taken to the Hospital. By last report he is improving.

Next Sunday, 23rd of May, will be the 29th Anniversary of the laying of the corner stone of the present Methodist church. Sermons will be preached morning and evening by Rev. Eber Crummy B. A., B. Sc., D. D., of Bathurst St. Methodist Church, Toronto. This will be a rare opportunity to hear this eloquent and learned divine who leaves in July for a pastorate in Winnipeg.
