pit.

Communications were laid on the
table from Ivan L. Wright, Thornhill,
re watercourse; from clerk of Mark-
ham stating that Councillor Padgett
had been appointed commissioner for
Markham re building sidewalks on
Yonge St., and asking Vaughan for a
similar appointment.

Thomas—Saigson—That the assess-
ment be paid for extra services each the
sum of \$20. Carried.
Cameron—Thomas—That this Coun-
cil grant to the village of Maple for the
purpose of building sidewalks of ce-
ment in said village the sum of one
hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00), pro-
vided the same amount shall be ex-
pended by the village for the same
purpose. Carried.
McNair—Thomas—That the Council
approve of plan submitted by C. P. R.
provided certain alterations are made.
Carried.

Saigson—Thomas—That W. H.
Grant, Esq., be instructed to enter
defence re Gamble vs. Township of
Vaughan and Markham. Carried.
McNair—Thomas—That the clerk be
and is hereby instructed to notify the
treasurer of the County of York to
have erased from the county books all
arrearages of taxes against the property
on lot 30, con. 1, assessed to F. J. Gal-
lanough, as said assessment was not a
valid one. Carried.
Cameron—McNair—That the clerk be
and is hereby instructed to notify the
Toronto & York Radial Railway
Co. to have ditch repaired opposite
lot 31, con. 1, Vaughan, on east side of
Yonge St., as this Council considers
the said company liable for the repair
and maintenance of said ditch. Car-
ried.

Resolutions were passed forbidding
the dumping of rubbish on the high-
ways, also forbidding people taking
sand from the highways without per-
mission from the Council.
Councillors McNair and Saigson
were appointed a committee to meet
committee from Markham Council re
building sidewalks on Yonge St.
Thomas—McNair—That the clerk be
and is hereby instructed to notify the
Grand Trunk Railway Co. that the
railway crossings and grades leading
thereto at lots 5 and 6, con. 3, Con-
cord; lots 15 and 16, con. 3, Sherwood,
and lots 25 and 26, on 4th con., Hope,
do not comply with the statutes, and
would request the said company to
have said crossings and grades attend-
ed to forthwith. Carried.
A by-law was passed authorizing the
King Telephone Company, Limited, to
erect poles, &c., on the highways of
the Township of Vaughan for the con-
duct of a telephone business.
A number of general accounts, road
accounts and Yonge St. accounts were
passed, and the Council adjourned to
meet on Tuesday, June 15.

up to topics of which the fisherman is
never weary. Sportsmen whatever
may be the special line they favor,
will find something in this issue appeal-
ing to them with particular force,
while the whole of the contents will be
found of general interest to all concern-
ed in the sporting advantages of the
Dominion.
