The citizens of this village and of the  
surrounding community for a number  
of years have been compelled to look  
back into past history when they de-  
sired to speak of the greatness of  
Thornhill. The fathers have told us  
of the greatness of this burgh in the  
days when it held a first place in  
Upper Canada as a wheat market,  
when Yonge St. for miles was alive  
with teams and men on their way to  
the flour mills of Thornhill where the  
wheat was ground for shipment across  
the sea to Old England. In those days  
we are told that it was discussed which  
was to have the first place, Toronto or  
Thornhill. Toronto won in the race,  
and it was left for Thornhill to die and  
await its resurrection for another op-  
portunity, and with the returning of  
the tide we already feel ourselves  
rising to again hold a unique place.  
If the steam railway, in other days,  
mitigated against the interest of our  
villa to the building up of the city to  
the south of us, we are glad that the  
day of restitution has come and To-  
ronto is now lending a helping hand in  
sending out some of her prominent  
citizens to seize with us the splendid  
opportunities now afforded in making  
this one of the most desirable resi-  
dential spots in Ontario. For some  
time little note has been taken of our  
mineral waters, but through the promi-  
nence which is now being given to  
the Sanitarium under the management  
of Dr. Peter B. Wood, with Mr. A. M.  
Tremaine as secretary-treasurer, the  
medicinal properties of these springs  
are being set before us again and we  
rejoice in the fact that the analysis of

mineral waters is placed in the first

those who have come to the Sani-  
tarium this season have united with  
others in testifying of the buoyancy  
of the air and the general invigoration  
from the magnificent elevation, the  
mineral waters and congenial sur-  
roundings. They also speak of the  
kindest attentions on the part of the  
management.

Harold Parkinson, who had the in-  
stalling of the plant for the supplying  
of water for the Sanitarium from the  
mineral springs was so successful in  
this enterprise that some of the citi-  
zens are endorsing Harold's scheme  
for fire protection as both feasible and  
commendable. It is very evident that  
Thornhill can have one of the very  
best systems of water-works both for  
supplying mineral water to the houses  
and for fire protection, the same en-  
gine being utilized to pump the water  
from the river as can be used in lifting  
it to the houses from the mineral  
spring.

The June meeting of Markham  
Township Council was held on Mon-  
day of last week. All the members  
were present.

A communication was received from

tween lots 5 and 6, con. 2.

On motion of Messrs Padget & Kirk  
a grant of \$75 was given towards  
graveling to townline between Markham  
and Pickering opposite lots 6, 7, and  
8 on the usual conditions. Reeve Lapp  
was appointed com'r to superintend  
the expenditure.

Messrs. Nigh and Kirk were appoint-  
ed com'r's to repair bridge between  
lots 20 and 21, con. 5.

Mr. Nigh was appointed a com'r to  
repair bridge on sideline between lots  
25 and 26, con. 3.

side of road, and report at next coun-  
cil meeting.

prohibiting the running at large of  
horses, cattle, sheep etc.

**MATTHEW J. LYMBURNER.**

The following short sketch relating  
to the late James Lymburner, is ta-  
ken from a recent number of the Buff-  
alo Courier:—

"The funeral of Matthew J. Lym-  
burner, who passed away on Thursday  
at his home, 622 Auburn avenue, was  
held from the family home to-day.  
Mr. Lymburner was an old time resi-  
dent of Buffalo, and was for many  
years associated with the late Jacob  
F. Schoellkopf in the tanning business  
in this city.

Born in Richmond Hill, Ont., in 1829  
the descendant of a hardy line of  
Scotch ancestors, Mr. Lymburner  
came to this city in 1866, and was for  
some years in the tanning business  
for himself in the old Hydraulics. He  
afterwards became associated with  
Mr. Schoellkopf, with whom he re-  
mained until the time of his retire-  
ment from active business life in 1900.

Besides his wife, Mary Clifford Lym-  
burner, the deceased is survived by  
four daughters, Tillie Lymburner,  
Margaret Lymburner, Mrs. George H.  
Lundy and Mrs. Franc Pleutner, and  
one sister, Mrs. John Graham, of  
Richmond Hill, Ont.
