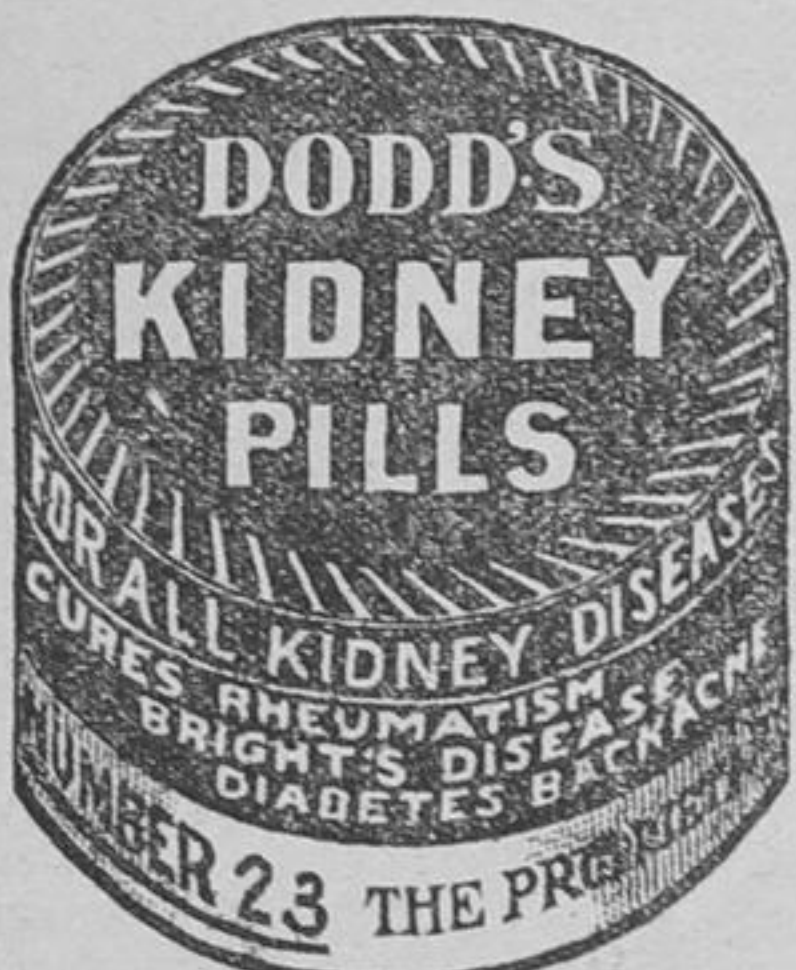

THE BURMAN AND HIS BEAST.
