

## TALKING AGAINST WAR.

Is there not too much of a tendency in British possessions to look toward Germany and the German Empire with an eye of hostility? If Germany feels inclined to build a number of Dreadnoughts, should she be told that she is making preparation for the invasion of England? Many times since the Kaiser has been at the head of affairs he has expressed himself in favor of peace, and why should his sincerity be doubted? So far, at any rate, he has not proved himself the bloodthirsty ruler that many predicted when he came to power. It is often unwise to doubt the utterances of those in authority, and express those doubts, unless it can be clearly shown that such men are utterly unworthy of confidence. In an afternoon speech, on Tuesday of last week, referring to his recent meeting with the Czar of Russia in favor of peace, the Kaiser is reported to have said:—

"Czar Nicholas and I agreed that our meeting is to be regarded as a vigorous reinforcement of the cause of peace. We feel ourselves as monarchs responsible to our God for the joys and sorrows of our respective peoples, whom we desire to lead forward as far as possible on the path of peace and to raise them to their full development.

All peoples need peace in order under its protection to fulfil undisturbed the duties of civilization for their economic and commercial development. We will both therefore continually endeavor, as far as lies in our power, to work with God's help for the furtherance and maintenance of peace."

May other nations not make light of such noble utterances, but may all work together in cultivating the arts of peace.

It employs practical means and appeals to the spiritual, social, mental and physical desires and tastes. In modern Association buildings, which most of our cities have, evening educational classes in the common and technical branches, lectures and travel talks, debates and parliaments, and the discussion of timely themes, supplemented by reading rooms, reference and circulating libraries, give abundant opportunity for self culture and advancement to all young men, and especially those who have been deprived of an early education.

Home-like social rooms and club-designed buildings encourage the natural expression of the social nature, and many lasting and helpful friendships are formed.

Well equipped gymnasiums, baths and swimming pools, with outdoor athletics, aquatics, and summer camps furnish recreation, make for health and efficiency, and help young men and boys to rightly understand their physical functions.

Young men are assisted in finding suitable boarding houses and useful employment.
