#### FORTUNATE FORESIGHT.

Every day provides evidence of the courage and foresight of the Laurier government-the policy adopted finds justification in events as they transpire, and the administration is vindicated as history is made. One cannot read a newspaper without meeting with a statement as to the crops of the three western provinces-in many of the districts fear is expressed that difficulty may be experienced in moving the crops. The difficulty of transportation is one to be met with each harvest and it is a difficulty that will be more apparent as the years go by. What would have been the position of the west had there been no Grand Trunk Pacific. This road is now completed from Winnipeg to Edmonton, and will be an important factor in moving the crops of this season. When this project was under consideration by the House it met with a most determined opposition by the Conservatives—their objection was based upon the contention that the railroad was unnecessary, and that the people as a whole would not approve of it.

The last number of The Sentinel, in speaking of the objects of the Orange society, says :- "The object of our order is resistance to the political propaganda of the Roman hierarchy." It is generally understood that the Orange order is more of a political organization than anything else. It is safe to say a large majority of Roman Catholies in Canada are Liberals. On the other hand nearly every Orangeman supports the Conservative party.

In a speech at the Constitutional Club, Mr. R. L. Borden summarized the view expressed by Parliament at the last session, commending it as a policy on which both parties were united, His summary was: - (1) That they recognized the duty of Canada to take her share in Imperial defence as her wealth and importance increased; (2) that the payment of regular and periodical contributions to the Imperial treasury was not, so far as Canada was concerned, the most satisfactory solution of the probmost satisfactory solution of the prob-lem of Imperial defence; (3) that the and 75c each. House would approve any expenditure necessary for the speedy establishment of a Canadian navy in close relation to and in co-operation with the Imperial navy and along the lines suggested by the Admiralty at the last Imperial conference; and (4) that the Canadian people would be prepared to make any sacrifices necessary for the purpose of co-operating with the Imperial navy in maintaining the integrity of the Empire and its naval supremacy.
