### REVENUE INCREASING.

### per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold A Handsome Gain for the First Four Months.

A despatch from Ottawa says: The revenue of Canada shows a handsome gain for the first four months of the present year. It totals \$30,030,311, an increase of four and a half million. During July alone the revenue was \$8,437,-438, or a million and three-quarters more than during the previous The increase in revenue came chiefly from customs collections, which show a gain of three and a half millions during the four months. There was a decline of a hundred thousand dollars in excise collections, an increase of \$25,000 in the postal revenue, and an increase of \$33\$,000 from railways and public works. The expenditure on consolidated account for the four months, as far as returns are in, was twenty and three-quarter millions, which is an increase of about three millions. The expenditure on capital account, as far as returned for the four months, is six and a half millions, an increase of about a million.
