
The feather washing industry which commenced operations in this village a couple of weeks ago seems to be doing

AFTER THE HOLIDAYS.

Rural schools re-opened last Mon-day, being the third Monday in Aug-ust. The new school law passed last sessson, says that urban schools shall sessson, says that urban schools shall re-open on the first of September, and High Schools on the first Tuesday of September, which this year will be Sept. 7. The meaning is not clear, but we presume that where a High School is situated as in Richmoud Hill, both High and Public Schools will re-open on the 7th of September.

The punishment for mutilating and The punishment for mutilating and attempting to pass mutilated coins is not generally understood, and is so severe that there is a reluctance to prosecute, and as a consequence many innocent persons are put to inconven-ience and loss, being only able to dis-pose of them as old silver at a mere fraction of their normal value. In or-der to relieve such persons and at der to relieve such persons, and at the same time to keep the currency clean, the minister of finance has now authorized the assistant receivers-general to take such coins at a dis-count of 25 per cent off their face value, so that they may be recoined at the mint.
