### AFTER THE HOLIDAYS.

### MAY GET 75c. FOR \$1.

The punishment for mutilating and attempting to pass mutilated coins is not generally understood, and is so severe that there is a reluctance to prosecute, and as a consequence many innocent persons are put to inconvenience and loss, being only able to dispose of them as old silver at a mere fraction of their normal value. In order to relieve such persons, and at the same time to keep the currency clean, the minister of finance has now authorized the assistant receivers-general to take such coins at a discount of 25 per cent off their face value, so that they may be received at the mint.
