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AERIAL TRAVEL.

Now that the science of aviation has
been so successfully developed that a
flight across the English Channel has
been achieved, perhaps it might be
permissible to give rein to the imagin-
ation and to indulge in speculation as
to the eventual potentialities of this
strange mode of locomotion. There
can be no question whatever now that
it has been so practically proved that
it is possible to construct machines
capable of making long aerial voyages
at rapid speed that in the near future
travelling by aeroplane will not be re-
garded with greater wonder than was
travelling by motor car a few years
ago; and it is possible that the flying
machine of the future will be as great
an advance over that by which the
brave Frenchman crossed the Channel,
both in magnitude and also in speed,
as the great Atlantic liner of the pre-

in which the ancient Briton ventured to
cross a river, or went fishing in a lake.

And if this supposition be fulfilled
how it will revolutionize travel, war-

to this altogether—even civilization and
national life generally. For if the air-
ship of the future were equal in size
and carrying capacity to the great
steamship of to-day; its speed of course
immeasurably increased; the resistance
of air and that of water; a great army
could be transported from one country
to any part of another in a few hours,
and invasion would be so easy, and
reprisals so feasible, that it is manifest
that international warfare must by
universal consent be discontinued.

And as nearly a mile a minute has been
attained, it may fairly be assumed that
a speed of very much more than a
hundred miles an hour will in the
future be practicable, so that a journey
across the Atlantic, or from London
say to the Pyramids, or to Jerusalem,
could be performed in a few hours;
and the tourist agent of the future
will perhaps be advertising a journey
round the world, even via the north
and south poles, to be accomplished in,
say a week!

be regarded that journeys would be
performed without horses at the speed

To the question whether the Indus-
trial Disputes Industrial Act has been
effective," says ex President Elliott in
McCLURE'S for September, "the clear
answer is that since its enactment in
March, 1907, the Dominion has known
no cessation in the continuous opera-
tion of any of its great agencies of
communication—steam railways, tele-
graph and telephone lines, or other
public utilities of the kind—and the
national industries and the public have
not suffered any inconveniences other
than a few of a purely temporary and
local nature through the cessation of
some mining operations. This remark-
able record may not be continuously
maintained; but it seems quite possi-
ble that never again will the interests
of the Canadian public be injured
through the threatening, or actual
outbreak of sudden and extensive in-
dustrial conflicts, such as frequently
occurred in Canada prior to the enact-
ment of the law, and still occur, with
enormous and widespread damage in
the United States."
