

STATUE OF KITCHENER.

Proposal to Erect One to Commemorate His Services.

A meeting of prominent Europeans and Indians was held at Calcutta recently to concert measures for the erection of a statue of Lord Kitchener to commemorate his services to India. The Chief Justice presided.

The Maharajah of Nagore referred in eulogistic terms to Lord Kitchener's services to the Indian army. The Maharajah of Burdwan spoke in a similar strain, and paid a high tribute to the Commander-in-Chief's military genius and powers of organization.

The sum of £9,000 was collected as a start, the Viceroy giving £50.

EXILE FOLLOWED TRAGEDY.

Shocking Crime Led Tilted Family to Ohio Town.

Considerable curiosity has often been expressed as to how it came that the Sulkowskis, despite their great wealth and their high rank (they are all princes and princesses) should have consented to bury themselves for a number of years in the small town of Bremen, Ohio. The departure of the late Prince Louis Sulkowski, Duke of Beilitz, from Austria, for the United States between 1850 and 1860, was immediately following a shocking tragedy—one of the darkest that has ever sullied the annals of an illustrious family. It was nothing more or less than the killing, under the most atrocious circumstances, of the mother of Prince Louis. She was assassinated one March night in 1848, at the Furstenhof, now the leading hotel of the town of Mayslowitz, in Northeastern Austria, but formerly the ancestral chateau of the Sulkowskis. While the actual deed was done by peasants, who were able to effect their escape to America, all the evidence went to show, in the most conclusive fashion, that one of the unfortunate woman's younger sons, Maximilian Sulkowski, was responsible for the crime, and morally guilty of matricide.

FAMOUS PIPES OF PEACE.

Etiquette of the Calumet Observed by American Indians.

When you read an account of the conclusion of a treaty with the Indians you are pretty sure to find that the calumet was brought out and handed around. The calumet is a pipe of peculiar construction. The bowl is of red sandstone, and the stem is of reed, about two and a half feet long. The stem is decorated with women's hair and feathers, which hang from it like a fringe.

This pipe is the famous "pipe of peace," used by the American Indian. After a treaty has been concluded, the pipe is produced and filled with tobacco. It is then handed to the representatives of the party with whom the treaty has been made, and they must take at least one whiff of it. It is afterwards passed around among the Indians present, who also take a whiff of it, and that ceremonial ratifies and makes sacred the compact that has just been entered into. The passing around of the calumet is an act of hospitality, and a refusal to take it is considered a dire offence.

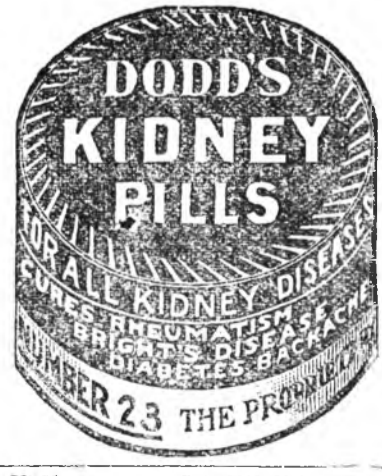

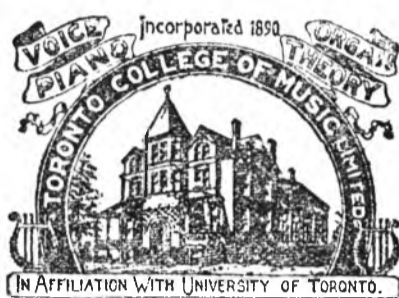
