

Mr. W. F. Maclean, M. P. for South York, seems to think that The Toronto Globe is not sincere in its campaign against betting at horse races. Words which fell from the lips of Rev. Dr. Chambers, Governor of Toronto Jail, at a meeting on Tuesday, show what a tremendous relation the liquor traffic of Canada bears to crime. Out of a total enrollment in the jail last year of 4,534, there were 2,208 with drunk and disorderly entered against their names. The Governor also stated that "the brightest minds in Toronto Jail have been brought there through the influence of the Woodbine."

Five senior students were taken before Colonel Denison on Monday of last week for mistreating the freshmen, and each was subjected to a fine. The magistrate is to be commended for the stand he took. He stated that if any more cases came before him he would be tempted to send the culprits to jail without the option of a fine. If students get to know that they will be treated just like other people who make fools of themselves the time-honored (?) custom of hazing will cease.
