I would like to suggest that Mr. Allan, (Methodist), Mr. Batty, (Baptist), Mr. Arthur Boyle, (Presbyterian), with one each from the English and Catholic churches and "Two of the boys." be a compilete and "Two of the boys," be a committee to consider ways and means. If "all have a mind to work," a neat, attractive room that will be an inspiration to the boys and young men, and a source of pride to the town, can be ready in a year.

A lot secured (on Yonge St. if possible) how long would it take two or three teams with men and boys to get ready for the foundations. Gladly would the country members of the different churches give a day or two with their horses to draw the necessary material, in this way the cost would be greatly reduced. Plan for the future, so the building can be enlarged as soon as the funds are on hand for the gymnasium, swimming tanks, lecture hall, and all the other requisites for an up-to-date Young Men's Christian Association.
