The discussion in the House of Commons a few days ago on the measure introduced by Mr. Miller to suppress gambling on race tracks was not creditable to a number of the members of Parliament. One gentleman solemnly told the House that he never knew of a young man who went wrong on account of betting on the races. Another said there was more money won or lost by women at a game of bridge, every day, than is won or lost at the Woodbine in a week. The discussion was wide of the mask. Public opinion is strongly in favor of amending the criminal code so that the evil of race track gambling may be encoaraged instead of encouraged.

The towns of Newmarket and Aurora are each advertising a bylaw to prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in those municipalities. By all accounts the by-law is likely to carry in each of those towns, although a three-fifths majority is necessary. As those towns lie so closely to each other it is to be hoped that if local option carry in one it will also carry in the other. In fact some temperance men think it would not be the success it ought to be if carried in only one of those places and rejected in the other. That being the case would it not be well to have it understood that the Council of one of the municipalities that might carry the measure would not give the by-law the third reading, after the vote, unless it were carried in the sister municipality? We believe that such an arrangement would greatly strengthen the temperance party.




