JOHN E. CLUBINE'S DEATH.

Few sadder tasks have fallen to the lot of the writer than to refer to the around themen ago went to a Burnal Hospital for treatment not telling his relatives where he was going. About a week ago his attention was drawn to an advertisement in the City news-papers asking him to return home at once as his brother William had suffered serious accident, and was lying in St. Michael's Hospital. He returned to Toronto at once, and the next three or four nights sat up with his brother in the Hospital. Monday evening he boarded the late car from Toronto and was let off near his sister's house, about 11 p m., apparently in a weak state. Instead of going to the house, however, he went to the stable where he was found dead the next morning. Drs. Hillary and Stevenson of Aurora afterwards examined the body, and pronounced the cause of death as heart failure. Coroner Hillary stated that an inquest was unnecessary.

Deceased was formerly one of the most energetic and thorough school teachers in this section of country, and for four years he was Principal of the Richmond Hill Public School, previous North Toronto. He had an amiable disposition and was greatly esteemed and respected by a large circle of friends who will learn with regret of his sudden death under such sad circumstations. cumstances. His remains will be laid to rest this afternoon beside those of his wife and children in the family plot in Maple Cemetery.
